Minutes of the Regular Meeting February 28, 2018

Call Meeting to Order. President Paetzold called the meeting to order at 5:03 pm.

Public Discussion. None.

Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the January 24, 2019 Regular Meeting of the Library Board of Trustees were reviewed. Freeman asked for clarification about the Neighborhood Center grant. A motion to approve the Regular Minutes was made by Baker and seconded by Kirsch. Motion carried 7/0.

Items for Discussion/Action.

FY20 Downtown Building Calendar. Kirsch asked about the difference between regular staffing and holiday staffing. Freeman reiterated how pleased she was the library remained open during the polar vortex. A motion to approve the proposed FY20 Downtown Building Calendar was made by Freeman and seconded by Washington. Motion carried 8/0.

Policy Review: 813: Unattended Children Policy. No changes were recommended to the policy by staff. No Board action required.

Family Parental Leave Policy. Paulios explained that a union/management meeting was held 1/9/19 at which time Paulios requested this benefit be extended to American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) staff. The Board has approved this benefit for Administrative/Confidential staff. Byers said a side letter offering the benefit was offered to library staff and fire staff. Kirsch asked about the side letter is. Byers explained a side letter addresses a specific issue to be addressed rather than opening the entire contract for one specific purpose. A request to extend the Family and Parental Leave Policy to cover eligible American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) has been approved by the City of Iowa City. This side letter would take effect as soon as the City Manager signs off on it after Board approval. A motion to extend coverage of

the Family and Parental Leave policy to eligible AFSCME staff was made by Kirsch and Seconded by Semel. Motion carried 8/0.

FY20 State Accreditation: Americans with Disability Act Checklist for Existing Facilities. Carman explained this is a new aspect to the accreditation process, comprising four sections, of which only one needs to be addressed by the library. We directed our focus on the first section of the checklist. Semel asked if we received any ADA complaints or requests from patrons. Carman said we are adding door openers to the Business Office. Beasley asked who owned the building. Carman said the City owns the building. Beasley thinks since the City owns the building it should be included in the process and thinks the City needs to fill out the ADA section. Paetzold said this checklist is a part of the accreditation process, and not about ADA compliance. Kirsch said her experience with the State Library is they are not policing things. Beasley wants a qualifier on the accreditation signature page stating that part 1 of the ADA checklist is subject to review by City staff and the library reserves the right to amend and revise based on City input. Carman thanked staff for their efforts on the accreditation document.

Staff Reports.

Director's Report. Carman noted the library stayed open during the polar vortex. We had some HVAC issues, one causing the east doors to be closed for a couple of days until the problem was fixed. Carman is meeting with outside agencies and getting to know other constituents in the community. Carman noted the Cleveland Public Library is going fine free. Semel asked about radical hospitality Carman mentioned when he was a candidate. Semel is also curious about what the hiring process was like from Carman's perspective.

Departmental Reports:

Children's Services. Freeman asked about the student success card and how will home-schooled students and Willowwind students would be included. Pilkington said homeschooled children in Iowa City are part of the school district. Pilkington said once the student success card has been distributed to the school district, it will offered to Regina and other schools.

Collection Services. Kirsch asked about the discovery kits. Mangano said the bike kit has bike tools and things one needs for fixing a bike. Typically the kits have books to support the specific activity plus the tools to help execute the activity. For example, the Birdwatching discovery kit has binoculars, a map, and books about birds. The checkout period is three weeks with no renewals. Patrons may place a hold on a discovery kit.

IT. No comments.

Development Office. McCarthy thanked Baker and West for helping at the Hy-Vee wine tasting fundraiser. This event was 5% ahead of last year; we received \$2947. McCarthy reminded everyone the Friends Foundation is hosting a community opportunity to Meet the Director on Thursday, May 16, 2019, from 4-6 pm in the downstairs gallery.

Spotlight on the Collection. No comments.

Miscellaneous. No comments.

President's Report.

Logsden, McCarthy, Paetzold have been meeting to assist Carman in meeting community members, service clubs, peer institutions, community partners, etc. Carman appreciates the group's assistance.

Nominating Committee. Paetzold said three people have volunteered to participate on the Nominating Committee. Semel had concerns about last year's process, which he pointed out did not violate the Bylaws. Semel said that two of the committee members nominated themselves last year. Paetzold stated that two members were nominated by others and included in the slate. Also, the Secretary was nominated for a third time. He believes the Board needs to look at this. Kirsch said arithmetically, only three people can be officers. Paetzold said the selection is done by the committee, the vote is by the entire board. Paetzold said last year a call was put out for Board members to nominate officers and a slate was presented. Beasley said that he would like the issue to be included in the process when the Board reviews the By-Laws. A By-Laws review committee has been established with Beasley, Semel, and Washington. They will come back to the group in May with recommendations. Baker, Kirsch, and Freeman will serve on the Nominating Committee with Baker to chair. They will meet next month to talk about the process.

Announcements from Members.

Committee Reports.

Foundation Members. No meeting.

Transition Committee. Kirsch said subjects discussed include: legacy budget questions; working with Byers on union matters; Iowa City UNESCO City of Literature (COL) relationship, the fine free implementation project. Also discussed was what is policy and what needs to be policy, for example, opening the lobby during the polar vortex. Carmen appreciates the Board responsiveness and coordinator assistance he has received. Paetzold encouraged him to ask for help if he needs it.

Communications. None. There were a number of articles in local press this month.

Disbursements.

The MasterCard expenditures for January, 2019 were reviewed. A motion to approve the disbursements for January, 2019 was made by Baker and seconded by Beasley. Motion carried 8/0.

Adjournment. A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Freeman and seconded by Washington. Motion carried 8/0. President Paetzold closed the meeting at 6:20 pm.

814: Library Copyright Policy—Regular Review

Proposal: This is a routine, three-year review of the Library Copyright Policy.

Issues: As a public library, we work diligently to balance the rights of our users and copyright holders as our collections, services, and programming are tied to copyrighted materials. The books on our shelves, the items we borrow through interlibrary loan, the movies we show at programs, and the reproduction equipment in our Digital Media Lab are all related to copyright and the federal law that establishes and protects it.

The Library Copyright Policy was first adopted in 1994 in response to concerns by the Board of Trustees about the reproduction, performance, and display of copyrighted materials. The concerns centered on the Library's VHS collections and the showing of live storytimes on The Library Channel, in which an entire picture book was read. In terms of the VHS collections, the Board wanted assurance that federal copyright law was not violated by allowing patrons to watch movies at the listening and viewing stations, as well as through lending out VCR players with recording capabilities for home use. The first iteration of this policy outlined how the staff would protect ICPL from liability by enforcing certain procedures, such as providing warnings on all materials and equipment about copyright law, limiting the number of people to a viewing station, and securing rights to books read at cable-casted storytimes. The Library reserved the right to revoke borrowing privileges of individuals suspected of violating copyright law.

Over the next two decades, this policy evolved from detailing our procedures in the policy to providing a more general understanding of what the Library's role is and how best to exercise this role. We take no reasonability for enforcing copyright law nor do we assume responsibility for the actions of our patrons. However, library liability as identified by the American Library Association, may come into play in places where equipment can reproduce copyrighted works (photocopier, scanner, microfilm reader, DVD converter, etc.) or groups using meeting rooms to play a film. In this policy, we outline that we will provide information about copyright to the public using our equipment and meeting rooms and explain that we are not responsible beyond these notices. As outlined in our recommended changes to the policy below, we want to emphasize the liability/responsibility statements more and provide more flexible language related to procedure.

This is an interesting year to review the Copyright Policy. Congress is considering moving the U.S. Copyright Office, currently a part of the Library of Congress, to the Patent Office as part of the Department of Commerce and making the head of the Copyright Office a presidential appointment. The American Library Association believes that this move would change the intention of copyright and have a detrimental impact on the general public. This bill, passed in the previous session by the House, has not passed the Senate yet. On the brighter side, a 20 year hiatus of works entering the public domain imposed by the Copyright Term Extension Act of 1998 ended in 2019. Robert Frost's New Hampshire, Kahlil Gibran's The Prophet, and Jean Toomer's Cane have all become public domain titles. Works in the public domain provide more options from publishers for library purchases and access to long forgotten titles both digitally and in print.

Staff Recommendations:

- 1. The current policy emphasizes the rights of copyright holders, but does not recognize the rights of our patrons to use our collections and equipment with the same weight. These rights are not acknowledged until later in the policy and it is tied to how we inform patrons of copyright law. Staff recommend making this policy more patron-focused by recognizing the balance of both: the rights of copyright holders and our patrons in the first statement. As recommended, the first point of the policy would state: The purpose of this policy is to recognize the rights of copyright holders and the rights of patrons to use Library materials and equipment.
- 2. Staff recommend making the two "assumes no legal responsibility for enforcement" and "assumes neither liability nor responsibility for patrons' actions" into separate points rather than a subset of how we will inform patrons of copyright law. These statements are important in explaining our staff's relationship with copyright law; they need the significance of their own points as 814.3 and 814.4.
- 3. The language about informing the public about the "limits which the law places on reproduction and performance of copyrighted material" from the original 814.3 is moved to statement 814.5. Staff recommend changing the language from "will inform" to "will make a reasonable effort to inform" as it provides more flexibility and allowance for when we are not able to do so. Patrons do not always read signage or user agreements, but we believe we've made a "reasonable effort" by using these tools to inform the public.

4. Small edits:

- a. In related polices, reflect the name change to the Internet User Policy (815).
- Remove capital letters from the phrase "Copyright Law" in 814.5A (formally 814.3 C); not used as a proper name of any U.S. law.
- c. Change the language of the last sentence of 814.5 A (formally 814.3 C) to list formats as opposed to specific equipment. This allows the policy to be more flexible for when new devices are added and older ones removed.
- d. Change the language in 814.5 B (formally 814.3 D) from "be asked to sign a statement asserting" to "need to acknowledge that they have obtained permission." We currently have copyright notifications on the sign out sheet when patrons book a meeting room and we telephone groups that have indicated that they are showing a film. In both of these cases we are "receiving acknowledgement," but the language change allows us to change procedures if needed.
- e. Change the language in 814.5 B (formally 814.3 D) from "or that they indemnify the Library and hold it harmless" to "will be notified that the Library is not liable for" to make the statement more clear and easy to understand.

814 Library Copyright Policy

See also related policies: Library Use (809) and Internet Use Policy (815)

- The <u>purpose of this policy is to Library</u> recognizes the rights of <u>the copyright</u> holders <u>of copyright</u> for <u>materials</u> and <u>the rights of patrons to use Library materials and equipment. The Library will not knowingly allow violation of the law either by staff or by the public.</u>
- The Library shall consider Fair Use Doctrine (Title 17 United States Code, Section 107) or Creative Commons factors when evaluating patron and staff use of materials for the purposes of copyright.
- 814.3 The Library recognizes the rights of patrons to use materials and will inform patrons about the limits which the law places on reproduction and performance of such works.
- 814.3 A. The Library assumes no legal responsibility for enforcement of copyright.
- 814.4 B. The Library assumes neither liability nor responsibility for patrons' actions.
- The Library will make a reasonable effort to inform patrons about the limits which the law places on reproduction and performance of copyrighted material.
 - C. A. Under copyright law Copyright Law, illegal duplication or sharing of copyrighted materials is prohibited. Copyrighted materials may include, but are not limited to, all printed matter, audio recordings, video recordings, computer software, databases, and digital files that are owned or licensed by the Library, obtained through interlibrary loan, or downloaded from the Internet. Warnings will be posted on or near all public equipment capable of reproducing or distributing materials including print, audio, and video, and visual materials. recorders, photocopiers, printers, and computers.
 - D. B. Library materials are for personal use only unless public performance rights have been obtained. Groups using playback equipment in the meeting rooms will need to acknowledge be asked to sign a statement asserting that they have obtained permission from the copyright holder and will be notified that the Library is not liable for for that they indemnify the Library and hold it harmless for any potential violations.

Summer Reading Program

The 2019 Summer Reading Program theme is **A Universe of Stories**. Brian Visser, Teen Services Librarian, has completed his summer activity schedule with many exciting programs and activities for Teens. A sample of the programs are a Cupcake Wars, a Captain Marvel film showing and DIY Bath Bombs. Teens who register for the program will be given a bookmark to complete or an online link to fill out. They will need to finish at least five components including reading three books. Brian will visit the high schools and junior high before school ends to share the story of how much fun can be had during the Summer Reading Program.

This year Beth Fisher, Programming Librarian, and I have been working with Professor Jennifer Burek Pierce's School of Library and Information Science class on Resources for Adults. We met with the class: once in person, with three of the off-site students Skyping in and then twice more with all of us in our respective classrooms or offices or homes. Using A Universe of Stories theme, the students brainstormed with staff. They then worked on ideas as a group and individually. The final time we met they presented us with their ideas which were both creative and practical. Beth had already programmed a stargazing and night sky watching event at Palisades-Dows Observatory and programs on lowa meteorites and meteor locations. The Resources for Adults students added to those topics with a student creating a celestial calendar for summer and a guide to which constellations can be easily seen this summer and which can be seen year round. Another student created a map of meteorite sites, observatories and space museums in Iowa. A student also suggested blog post topics to promote summer reading as well as developing a list of print, digital and AV materials in our collection related space and the universe, both real and imagined. And finally, another student shared a wealth of ideas on collaborative programming options and craft and creation ideas. All in all, the students in Resources for Adults, proved to be wonderful partners in planning. I hope that students who live in lowa City are able to attend some of this summer's programs and workshops and that you all will come too.

Channel 20 Farewell

Beginning April 3, The Library Channel will no longer be broadcast on Channel 20 via Mediacom. This decision was made by lowa City Public Library administrators due to changing technology and the increased costs associated with broadcast equipment.

The Library Channel has originated from the lowa City Public Library. Its primary mission was to extend Library programs for children and adults to a wider audience and to inform the community about Library services. Easy access to programs at ICPL will be available through ICPL's YouTube channel The Library Channel. Viewers everywhere will be able to watch live streamed programs and share them with anyone. While there may be an impact on those who do not have computers and/or Internet access, the continuing decrease in Mediacom subscribers leads us to believe that not that many viewers will be affected. We may also be able to offer more interactive options with Facebook Live options in the future, further expanding the reach of the Library.

Books and Library Information at Laundromania and Ethnic Grocery Stores

Through the City of Iowa City's Equity Toolkit exercise we've been working on sharing Library information in new venues and seeking opportunities to share information with community members who do not get information through traditional sources. Through our work, we learned about sharing information at grocery stores (Everyone Eats initiative) and laundromats. ICPL staff delivered Library information, including our "How to Get a Library Card" flyers translated into Swahili, French, Spanish and Arabic, to local ethnic grocery stores. We also got permission to post Library information and set-up a small collection of books at the two Laundromanias in Iowa City. Also, as a part of this initiative, we began mailing information about Library programs and services, including the monthly Children's and Adult/Teen calendars, to 120 community organizations each month. hope is the organization has a bulletin board where they will post the information or they might choose to share information about the Library in newsletters they produce. So far we have received positive feedback.

Help Desk and Page Training

Each year, staff who work at the Help Desk brush up on our skills in the spring in anticipation of Summer Reading Program. We recently updated our Help Desk Training Manual to assure it meets the training needs for new staff members. We are also reviewing procedures with Community & Access Services Pages, especially emergency and severe weather procedures. CAS Pages are the staff members who check in audiovidual materials and shelve a lot of materials in the building. They also work on the Help Desk with permanent staff members. We know good training leads to good customer service so we try to invest quality time into training our staff.

Bookmobile and Cold Weather ... and Warm Weather

The long winter was hard on everyone, including the Bookmobile. We thought about the Bookmobile heaters as "the little heaters that could" as they worked to keep the Bookmobile warm this winter. Unfortunately, at the beginning of March, the heaters failed from over use. Despite many attempts, the City's Equipment Division is having trouble isolating the problem and repairing them. After this winter, we believe we will need to find an indoor, heated space to store the Bookmobile next winter. We'll be OK this summer but we've started inquiring about indoor space beginning in November. If you know of a location where we can store a 32' long, 8'6" wide, 9'1" tall vehicle that weights about 22,000 pounds, please let Kara know.

And speaking of warm weather, the Summer Bookmobile Schedule is complete. We juggled around many stops to work with the ICCSD/Neighborhood Centers of Johnson County pool schedule. We also added two stops: Resurrection Assembly of God on Keokuk Street (recommended through the Equity Toolkit initiative) and Autumn Park on Muscatine Avenue (their residents lobbied for a Bookmobile stop).

Visit to the Lone Tree City Council Meeting

Kara spoke to the Lone Tree City Council at their March 4th meeting and shared information about the collections, programs and services their residents could use as a part of their contract. The Council requested packets of Library information they could share with people living in and considering moving to their community. They also requested staff visit their Community Building and Senior Dining Program to share information about the Library. Library staff will travel to Lone Tree in the Bookmobile on Friday April 5th from 11 AM to 1 PM to visit with community members, share information, give tours of the Bookmobile and register residents for Library Cards.

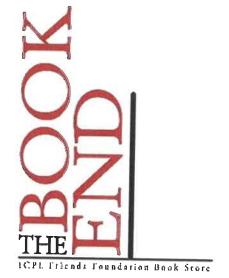

The End (of Winter) is Nigh By Morgan Reeves, children's librarian at the Iowa city Public Library

It may be hard to believe, as this winter has been particularly long, cold, and snowy, but spring is almost here. Everyone prepares for spring in their own way; I like to shelve the cozy familiar reads and start something fresh. Here are some of the titles on my "Dreaming of Spring" list.

I'm hoping to read more than five books for adults this year, a lofty goal for this children's librarian. So at the top of my list I've put "Black Leopard, Red Wolf" by Marlon James. It's the beginning of a fantasy trilogy that promises mythology mash-ups, an African setting, and literary language. A new nonfiction title that recently popped up on my radar, "Outer Order, Inner Calm," speaks to my current desire to de-clutter brought on by watching "Tidying Up with Marie Kondo." It's also written by one of my favorite authors/podcasters Gretchen Rubin. I'm excited to pick up the first collection of "Mirenda," a comics series by Grim Wilkins that hits some of my favorite notes: lush fantasy setting, woman hero, and of course magic.

It has been far too long since I dove into YA fiction, so I'm adding the boarding school sci-fi romance with a cloning twist "The Similars" by Rebecca Hanover to my list. While cataloging, I see YA nonfiction every day, but I can't just stop and read each eye-catching title as I see it, so I immediately put a hold on the young reader version of fencer Ibtihaj Muhammad's memoir "Proud."

As a fan of cats and news, I'm also highly anticipating "Lupin Leaps In," the new middle grade collection of comics from Georgia Dunn.

Of course my list wouldn't be complete without a few picture books to look forward to. "Felipe and Claudette" by Mark Teague is certain to make me thankful for my own adopted cat and dogs. With friends and family welcoming new babies this year, I imagine I'll be gifting "You Are New" the newest picture book from one of my favorite cartoonists, Lucy Knisley. I'm certain to enjoy the soft colors and peaceful stories in "Zen Happiness" by Jon Muth.

I hope these titles inspire you to make your own anticipatory list of books to greet spring. Find something to look forward to at ICPL downtown or on the Bookmobile.

I've always been drawn to comic books. For me, nothing beats the marriage of words and art to tell a story. I'm lucky because now I get to select the titles that go into the Iowa City Public Library's Comic, Graphic Novel and Manga collection! There have been a lot of graphic novels that I've read lately the feature LGBTQ characters and stories. Hopefully, they'll bring you as much joy as they brought me.

"Check, Please! Vol. 1: #Hockey" by Ngozi Ukazu started out as a web comic before being collected in book form. Eric Bittle, a southern boy who finds himself at a college in Massachusetts for his freshman year on a sports scholarship, is a lot of things. He's a well-known vlogger, baking machine, and talented hockey player (he's a bit afraid of getting body checked, though). This is a sweet, funny story of Eric, affectionately called Bitty by his teammates, transitioning into college life while grappling with feelings for his handsome, broody hockey captain. Stick around for Bitty's tweets at the back of the book. They're hilarious and flesh out some of the character's relationships.

It's rare that a book floors me over quite like "The Prince and the Dressmaker" did. First off, Jen Wang's art is GORGEOUS. There is a so much character and detail oozing out of each panel. Every person in this book is so lovingly drawn, especially Frances, the main character, who is a seamstress living in Paris. One of Frances' dress designs catches the eye of the crown prince, Sebastian, who hires her. The Prince has an unexpected request, he wants Frances to make him glamorous dresses that he'll wear out on the town. Frances agrees and soon is accompanying Sebastian while he goes out as his alter ego, Lady Crystallia. Things are complicated by the fact that Sebastian's parents are trying to get him married, and that Sebastian and Frances might be interested in being more than friends. This book is a delight and easily one of my favorite graphic novels.

"Bloom" by Kevin Panetta and Savanna Ganucheau was a wonderful surprise. Colored in different shades of blue, Bloom explores the relationship of two boys -- Ari and Hector -- as they spend the summer working in Ari's family's bakery. Only Ari isn't interested in baking, but Hector loves it and is going school for it. Ari can't wait to get out of town and is hopeful that he and his friends will hit it big with their band. Ari and Hector are pretty different. Ari is sulky while Hector is easy going, but, despite their differences, they fall for each other. There are these amazing two-page spreads throughout the book of the boys baking together and sharing warm, loving looks. It's so cute! The supporting cast includes Ari and Hector's friends who are just as magnetic. I hope there are more stories about them in the future.

All of these titles, and more, can be found in the Library's Comic, Graphic Novel and Manga collection!

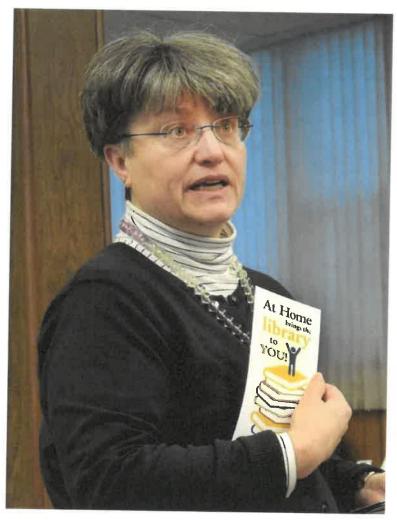

Iowa City library offers services to Lone Tree

The Iowa City Public Library offers services to Lone Tree residents that often are going unused because people don't know they are available.

Kara Logsden, the library's community and outreach coordinator, began the process of better promoting the library services in Lone Tree with a presentation to the City Council Monday night.

"It is the busiest library in the state of Iowa," Logsden said.

Many of those services are available from home with an Iowa City library card. The library will mail library items to participants in the At Home program, including books, large print books, books on CD, CDs, DVDs and magazines. There is no charge for these services that are provided to people who are confined to their homes.

"For people who can't come to the library, that's a real nice service," Logsden said.

Services available to all library card holders include online access to the New York Times, digital magazines, Consumer Reports and test preparation resources for SAT, ACT and postal service exams. Card holders also get access to streaming movies and can check out laptops and Wi-Fi hotspots.

Lone Tree spends \$17,721 for lowa City library services in addition to \$8,474 the city allocates for salaries at the Lone Tree library, which is shared with the Lone Tree schools.
