ECO Iowa City draws to a close

What a year and a half it has been! Through an ICMA Public Library Innovation Grant, the Iowa City Public Library and the Iowa City Landfill and Recycling Center created ECO Iowa City to promote environmental sustainability in Iowa City. Efforts began in spring 2009 and continued through fall 2010.

ECO brought together more than 45 city and county departments and state agencies as well as local and regional environmental groups. It presented programs on topics such as the flood of 2008, vermicomposting, how to make your own rain barrel, and making your home more energy efficient.

One of these partners perhaps summed up best the work of ECO Iowa City. Liz Christensen, Director of the new UI Office of Sustainability said, "ECO Iowa City has been the mechanism by which all the community environmental groups have been able to come together and collaborate. We at

the UI Office of Sustainability are very pleased to be a partner and to be able to learn what other groups are doing. We've been able to build new partners because of this effort and look forward to future opportunities they will bring."

Organizers hosted a book discussion of "Animal Vegetable Miracle," a food film festival and a green New Year's Eve party. ECO sponsored two sales of compost bins and one of rain barrels, all at a greatly reduced price. Multiple groups worked together to offer a collection of expired and unused medications, which netted over 135 pounds of pharmaceuticals. ECO Iowa City made itself known at many Farmers Markets. Organizers also helped with children's programming, including a ghost bike ride to Oakland Cemetery on Halloween Eve. This spring and summer, ECO Iowa City was involved in the formation of at least three community gardens, including the Children's Discovery Garden at the

Iowa City Recreation Center. ECO will sponsor another pharmaceutical collection

on Saturday, September 18, on the west side of Iowa City. Come to ECO Iowa City's final event at 2 p.m. September 19 in Meeting Room A. Rowan Jacobsen, author of "American Terroir," will speak on "flavor landscapes" and the importance of local foods. His talk is part of

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Busy year marked by advances in technology, strategic planning Updated website, new self-check stations, eBook collection debut

From eBooks to eAudio, from new self-check stations to a mobile website, the Iowa City Public Library is a leader in offering new technology for its patrons. A new mission statement declares the Library will be "an innovative and responsive community center that supports lifelong learning, literacy and access to the world of ideas" in the years to come.

The Library maintained its high level of use during the fiscal year, with more than 1.5 million checkouts, and more than 746,000 people through the doors

between July 1, 2009 and June 30, 2010. The Library's strategic plan was updated, a major upgrade to equipment and software used to check Library materials in and out was completed, and several important partnerships were

strengthened. **ICPL** launched a new website

(http://www.icpl.org/) that had been in the works for over a year. Mobile access to the site was made easier with the introduction of a new interface for mobile devices (http://m.icpl.org) and overall website page views were up almost 50 percent this year.

"Our goals were to create a site that was easier to read and navigate," said Susan Craig, Library Director.

"Flexibility was also a goal so we could accommodate changes in the future."

This helps the Library get the word out about programs and services by featuring news and events in a series of highlights across the top of the ICPL homepage and through the Newsroom (http://newsroom.icpl.org/), a new blog that features Library news.

A project to replace aging self-check station hardware and software grew into an improved materials handling system, new security gates and four new self-check stations. Patrons have

surveys were conducted in the fall. Nearly three out of four respondents visited ICPL in the past year and more than a third visited 10 or more times. Seventy-seven percent of those heavy users rated the Library as excellent. The Library Board and staff developed a new mission statement and core values using this community input. The new plan (http://www.icpl.org/policies/) was adopted in June.

The headquarters of Iowa City UNESCO City of Literature, a nonprofit established following the UNESCO designation in the fall of 2008, is located on the Library's second floor. ICPL staff contributed to many City of Literature projects, including the Iowa City Book Festival this summer.

ECO Iowa City, a grant-funded initiative of the Library and the Iowa City Landfill and Recycling Center to help Iowa City residents live greener, brought together more than 45 partner organizations this year. Local groups appreciated the increased visibility and cooperation between local organizations.

The Iowa City Public Library Friends Foundation has become an integral part of the success of the Library. They had a banner year, raising more money than ever in a year when there was no capital campaign. The Foundation's primary support goes to collections, and more than \$100,000 in gift money was spent on Library materials this year.

"Public libraries are increasingly important for free access to the Internet, children's programming, community spaces, technology support and meaningful community partnerships," said Craig. "We look forward to an exciting future."

Spotlight on the Collection New Big Books in the Children's Room

The Library has added a new circulating collection of large picture books as part of its commitment to encouraging early literacy awareness. Called "Big Books," these items are oversize versions of familiar stories and poems which can be used during shared reading sessions.

Many of these books are good for cooperative activities as they have stories that are predictable, rhythmic, repetitive and interactive. They are ideal for teachers and child care providers to share with groups of children because of their large illustrations. Their extra-large print means they are also good for one-on-one use by parents with beginning readers, when children

may need extra help focusing.

The "Big Books" collection is located in the Children's Room near the Storytime Room. They can be checked out for three weeks and renewed once. Like art prints, we ask that patrons please return these items to the Library during regular business hours because they will not fit in the book returns or remote drop boxes.



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The Iowa City Public Library established the annual Carol Spaziani Intellectual Freedom Festival in 1995 to honor Carol's 26-year career at ICPL and life-long commitment to the freedom of ideas. Spaziani believes the

public library's role is to be a resource and a forum for an individual's pursuit and expression of diverse points of view. All programs are free and open to the public.





September is Library Card Sign-up Month



Celebrate Library Card Sign-up Month in September and apply for an Iowa City Public Library borrower card. There is no charge for your first card, and most area residents qualify. If you live in Iowa City, rural Johnson County, or the cities of Hills or University Heights, you will receive a resident card that entitles you to all of the Library's

If you do not have a library card yet, you can register online at www.alec.icpl.org or in person at the Cards Desk anytime the Library is open. To get a card, you will need to show a photo ID and proof of your residence address. Acceptable ways to show your address are a current driver's license, voter registration card, lease or a piece of mail that was postmarked within the last month.

Already have an ICPL borrower card? You

can get a free replacement card in September. If you have been thinking about swapping your card for a key tag card, which attaches to your keychain, now is a great time to do it. New Library patrons will get a choice of a regular-sized card or a key tag card. After September, replacing your card costs \$1.

Iowa City Public Library does not have an age requirement for library cards. Children can get a card when their address is verified using a parent or guardian's identification.
